SC 2023-0884 - Appendix A Code for Resolving Professionalism Referrals 3.7 Reporting

- a) Each LPP must file a written report with the chief judge of its circuit, the Florida Supreme Court, and The Florida Bar identifying all professionalism referrals received against a member of The Florida Bar in June and December of each calendar year.
- b) The biannual reports must include the following information for each referral for the six (6) calendar months preceding the month in which the report is due:
 - 1. The date of the referral;
 - 2. The circuit in which the issue arose;
 - 3. A short summary detailing the substance of the referral;
 - 4. The relationship of the respondent voluntarily participated in the process;
 - 5. Whether or not the respondent voluntarily participated in the process;
 - 6. The resolution, if any, of the referral; and
 - 7. Whether there were previous referrals against the respondent.
- c) The reports must not include identifying information for the respondent or the party who submitted the referral.

INFORMATION FOR SUBMITTERS

- 1. **Purpose and Use:** This form collects information about your Circuit's Local Professionalism Panel and its activity for the last six (6) months. This form also asks for updates to the contact information for your Local Professionalism Panel. The information about your Circuit's Local Professionalism Panel will be used to update the Center's Local Professionalism Panel contact list, as well as to gauge how each Circuit is carrying out panel activities.

1. Please describe the process by which complaints are addressed. You may attach a link to the complaint form or link to where information is located on your website that advises the consumers, attorneys, and judges how to file a complaint.

At present, complaints are accepted via email by the chair of the Panel. After reviewing the complaint, the chair either calls a meeting of the entire Panel or assigns the complaint to a member of the Panel for further investigation prior to bringing the matter before the entire Panel. The Panel will decide whether the complaint is best suited to be addressed with the respondent on either a one-on-one basis or as a group. The Panel will then notify the respondent of the complaint and set a meeting to address the issue. However, the Panel may decide that the issue detailed in the complaint is one that cannot be addressed at the local level, at which point the chair will refer the matter to the Florida Bar.

Our circuit is currently working to revamp the procedures of our LPP. The new procedure will be contained within an administrative order, which will be posted on the Circuit Court website along with any supporting documentation.

2. Please describe what types of professionalism issues are seen most often in this Circuit?

Historically, complaints in our Circuit have primarily dealt with scheduling/attendance issues, delays in communication, and unprofessional electronic communications.

3. What are believed to be the causes of professionalism issues within your Circuit?

The most common causes of professionalism issues in our Circuit have been:

1) being overworked as a result of taking on more cases than an attorney can manage and/or poor time management,

2) personal stressors, and

3) adjusting to the changes in the practice of law post-Covid.

4. How often does your Circuit's Local Professionalism Panel meet?

At present, we typically meet as part of the Circuit's quarterly Bench/Bar meetings and as needed to discuss referrals. We also have at least one stand alone meeting per year.

5. Please describe any training provided to committee members.

To date, no training has been provided. We will be implementing the mandatory training required by the Supreme Court as soon as it is available. Going forward, we will also be considering supplemental trainings.

6. How is your Circuit's Local Professionalism Panel promoted?

A list of the members of the Panel can be found in an administrative order on the Circuit's website. The Chief Judge and the Panel will be providing a presentation to the local bar association in 2024. Once the local bar association completes their new website, information about the LPP will be included there for use by both attorneys and the public.
